The Shepherd's Voice

Everyone knows that the Dalai Lama instructs his followers not to use violence against those who oppress them. He opposes violent rebellion against the authoritarian rule of the Chinese over Tibet.

Our Lord was just as strongly opposed to the use of violence against those who oppressed the Jewish people of his day. He opposed violent rebellion against the authoritarian rule of the Romans over Israel.

This stance permeates all that Jesus did and comes through many of his parables and stories, but sometimes we can miss allusions to this teaching. Today's gospel is no exception.

We are all very familiar with Jesus playing with the image of shepherding, sometimes making himself the gate of the sheep yard in which the sheep were protected during the night.

Another image he uses depends on the fact that in Jesus' time, as today around Jerusalem, the flocks are small (thirty or so) and the shepherd leads from the front: they follow him, or more precisely, the sound of his voice. If they follow that voice, and no other, they will be safe and will reach good pasture.

Whose other voices might try to mislead the sheep?

Jesus describes them as those of 'thieves and brigands'.

In John's gospel, two people are actually named, one as a thief, another as a brigand. The first is Judas, the second is Barabbas, and both were involved in violence.

Judas, the thief from the common purse of the disciples, eventually betrays Jesus and does so with violence. He led a sizeable group of temple guards and some Roman soldiers to the Garden of Gethsemane to take Jesus by force.

Peter tried to prevent Jesus being snatched away by this armed force. He drew his sword and wounded one of the High Priest's servants. Jesus immediately rebuked Peter. Why?

Jesus knew that Peter was to become the shepherd of his flock of followers. Shepherding the flock of Christ's followers is completely incompatible with the use of violence.

Barabbas was a brigand. Other gospel writers make it clear that he was a leader of an insurrection against Roman rule. Our Lord knew that armed rebellion against the Romans would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersal of the Jewish people (about forty years later). This 'brigand' was not acting in the best interests of the flock of Israel, but would actually lead to the death of many and the remnant being scattered throughout the world. He was no true shepherd.

So, there is much more to the contrast between the 'Good Shepherd' and 'thieves and brigands' than first meets the eye. Jesus is warning his followers against the seductive voices of those who advocate the use of violence.

In particular, the successor of Peter should echo the voice of Jesus the Good Shepherd and no other. Peter was entrusted by Our Lord with the words 'Feed my lambs; feed my sheep'. Peter and his successors are the shepherd of Christ's flock. That is why they carry a crozier – a shepherd's staff with a hook at the top to rescue lambs which have fallen down a gully.

Honouring our first two priests, 200 years after their arrival

Australia's first two Catholic priests arrived on May 3, 1820.

On Sunday, exactly 200 years later, they will be honoured at a Mass at 10:30am at St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney. The Mass will be livestreamed via the St Mary's Cathedral You Tube channel.

Fr John Joseph Therry and Fr Philip Conolly sailed from Cork, Ireland, on a ship carrying more than a hundred convicts and were authorised by both Church and state to celebrate Mass in Sydney. Their arrival on May 3, 1820, came after decades of hostility in which public Masses were forbidden in New South Wales.

While Fr Conolly only remained in Sydney for less than a year before being sent to Tasmania, Fr Therry spent more than 40 years in the city and left a remarkable legacy, helping to establish the first church where St Mary's Cathedral now stands.

GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

- WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

"I will give you shepherds after my own heart" (Jer.3:15)



Occurring on the fourth Sunday in the Easter Season, Good Shepherd Sunday derives its name from the day's gospel reading (John 10:1-10) where Christ is described as the "Good Shepherd" who lays down his life for his sheep.

"Dear friends, on this day in particular, but also in the ordinary pastoral life of our communities, I ask the Church to continue to promote vocations. May she touch the hearts of the faithful and enable each of them to discover with gratitude God's call in their lives, to find courage to say "yes" to God, to overcome all weariness through faith in Christ, and to make of their lives a song of praise for God, for their brothers and sisters, and for the whole world. May the Virgin Mary accompany us and intercede for us." - Pope Francis, World Day of Prayer for Vocations, 2020.

A PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS You might know of a young person in the parish, in your family or an acquaintance whom you think would make a good priest or religious. Why not pray for them by name on a regular basis? Carry them with you 'spiritually' to Mass on Sunday (when Masses resume). Sometimes the Lord uses us as his instruments to encourage vocations. VOCATIONS SUNDAY

About two years ago Bishop Greg appointed me to the vocations team for our diocese, the younger priests on the team are doing a great job as is Fr Peter Wood the Director of Vocations for our Diocese. As a member of this committee I encourage the other members to see vocations as more than just the priesthood and religious life, even though they are vitally important and integral to the life of the church

I personally am more interested in the vocation of all the Baptised. In the mid 1950's Pope Pius XII wrote a beautiful document on the Mystical Body of Christ. In many ways this document was a precursor to the work of the Second Vatican Council. Our Church has always taught us that when we are baptised we become members of the Body of Christ, each human person will bring his or her own God given gifts to the world for the service of the world. We live our vocations as Christian men and women by:

- 1. By becoming more aware of people who come into our lives
- 2. By becoming aware of the simple needs of these people and then acting to do something about those needs.
- 3. By taking actions to eliminate from life the things which would insult the dignity, the value and destiny of any person.
- 4. By making efforts to create an atmosphere in which it will be easier for people to live a happy, human life in accordance with their God-given dignity and value
- 5. By assisting others to come to a personal friendship with God who loves them intimately and who created them. (*The Mystical Body by Rev. James Anderson 1958*)

In other words each of us has a vocation to holiness, wholeness of life and service of others. I am a strong believer that if we all live our vocations to the fullest, then from the local church, the local gathering of Christ's faithful, God will call forth from amongst us those to serve at the altar and religious life.

Finally and most importantly is the amazing vocation to holiness which is the Sacrament of Marriage. It is within marriage that Saint John Paul II, says resides the most humble presence of Christ and the Church. The couple make Christ present to each other and teach their children in the ways of God.

We are all invited to see this "Good Shepherd Sunday" as the call to each of us to a life of holiness and service. It is far wider than just us priests and religious. We are all members of the Mystical Body of Christ, together, we are the people of God.
