THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD - YEAR A 24 May 2020

The space between science & religion

Soviet cosmonaut, Yuri Gagarin, was the first man to rocket into space. In 1961 when he returned to earth he said: "I went up into space but I saw no angels and did not meet God." Similarly, Gherman Titov, whose mission followed Gagarin's a few months later, gave speeches to large crowds at the 1962 World's Fair in Seattle that included a similar sentiment.

It is a recurring theme in Western pop culture to oppose science and religion: science gives us concrete, indisputable knowledge, whereas religion gives us stories and dreams. Jesus's miracles, his resurrection from the dead and his ascension to the right hand of the Father: these contradict what science knows about the world. Such beliefs are therefore impossible; they are pie in the sky fantasy.

The world is a closed, coherent system of physical cause and effect; there is no place for God, for spiritual beings like angels or demons; no heaven or hell; no goodness or evil beyond or above the human mind. There is only the world that science studies, the physical world that can be measured and accurately predicted, the world that can be controlled, harnessed for humanspecific ends.

Such is the story that scientism, an ideology, tells itself and anyone else who will listen. (Science in itself tells no story at all; it only uses specific methods to make observations and draws conclusions based on specific assumptions.) Scientism is based on a myth. In fact, any ultimate explanation of reality, good or bad, weak or strong, profound (like religion) or unsophisticated (like scientism), demands an organising story-intelligence. We always require "myth" to give a frame and a context that allows us to organise our kinds of knowledge, like science.

The Ascension: Jesus "was lifted up, and a cloud hid him from their sight." Was Jesus the first spaceman, riding his invisible rocket up into the sky? If so, he would have fallen back down. And if he could have lived to tell, he would have said, like the Soviet cosmonauts, that he did not see God up there above the clouds. Or rather, was the cloud that hid him the "cloud of glory" that enshrouds the unapproachable Almighty God?

Was the heaven he entered the heaven that the physical sky above symbolises, reflects, points to, makes manifest? I, for one, do not doubt that on that day, two millennia ago, Jesus, risen from the dead, ascended physically into the sky before the eyes of his astounded followers. Science cannot tell me if the Ascension is true or false. The Ascension, however, gives science all the room it requires to do its work. So which approach to reality? Scientism or religion, is the more sophisticated, more coherent, more in touch with the way things really are?



OUR LADY HELP OF CHRISTIANS FEAST DAY - MONDAY 25TH MAY

This feast has been celebrated in Australia since 1844 but the history to this day dates back to the start of the 1800's.

The infant church in Australia had a special reason for turning to Mary. No priests were sent to the colony in its early days and Mass was not allowed except for one brief year until 1820. It was largely the Rosary in those early days that kept the faith alive. Catholic Australia remained faithful to Mary and was the first nation to choose her under the title Help of Christians, as principal Patroness.

The Church has traditionally focussed on two aspects of Our Lady's help on this feast day. Firstly, upon the role of Our Lady's intercession in the fight against sin the life of a believer. Secondly, Our Lady is one who assists Christians as a community, through her intercession, in fighting against anti-Christian forces. The feast, normally celebrated on the 24th will be celebrated on Monday the 25th this year to avoid a clash with the feast of the Ascension.

This year as the Covid-19 pandemic continues to affect Australians' lives, including their worship, the Catholic bishops will entrust the country to the care of Mary Help of Christians on her feast day. Bishop Gregory will do this at his 8:00am Mass on Sunday.

GOSPEL REFLECTION by Greg Sunter

The short gospel passage for today is taken from the final words of the gospel of Matthew. It is known as 'The Great Commission' as Jesus is portrayed commissioning his disciples to go out to the world and spread the good news. They are charged to 'Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations.' This is the basis of much of the missionary work of the Church that has gone on ever since then.

However, the focus of today's feast is much more on the first reading than the gospel. The opening verses of the Book of Acts, from the author of Luke-Acts, describe the final instructions of Jesus to his disciples and then his 'lifting up'. The Luke-Acts writer is the only gospel writer to actually describe the Ascension. The fact that the other gospels don't discuss the Ascension in any detail at all is a good indication that this description should not be taken literally.

However, the message of the Ascension is a powerful one. It reminds us that Jesus, the human incarnation of God on earth, was limited to a specific time and place in history. Despite the physical limitations of his life on earth, Jesus ensured that his message and ministry would continue through those he had taught. Knowing that the disciples would need time to grieve and come to terms with all that had occurred in a relatively short space of time, Jesus promised that the Spirit would come upon them in the days to come. That visiting of the Spirit upon the disciples at Pentecost was the motivation to set about doing what Jesus had charged them to do. Without the Ascension, there is no Pentecost.

50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS - NOW A 51ST!



Unfortunately the planned 50th anniversary celebrations for St Joseph's in August will not take place this year due to COVID-19 restrictions and the uncertainty of when mass gatherings will be permitted again.

We will now be holding a 51st Anniversary in 2021! Date to be advised. The organising committee ask that our community members past and present continue collecting and sending any memorabilia, photos etc in to school. While the date may have been set back the preparations are continuing!

DIOCESAN SUPPORT FOR THE 2019 BUSH FIRES - UPDATE

The Diocese has now distributed all monies received by the Bishop's 2019 Bush Fires Appeal. As you will recall the Diocesan Fire Appeal 2019 was established to support those affected within the Lismore Diocese by the bush-fires that occurred at the end of 2019.

The Bishop wrote to all local councils who distributed the Diocesan pro-forma claim form to those affected in their area. Assistance was provided to 171 affected households from within the Diocese, totalling \$85,500.

A \$40,000 donation was made to Rotary Casino who distributed it to Blaze Aid for the clearing of fence lines. This resulted in the clearing 41km of damaged fences on affected properties. Business support was also provided to the Willawarrin General Store and Macleay Valley Rural Store (\$10,000 each), and Northern Agriservices – to replace the fence around the Rappville cemetery (\$1,377).

SUMMARY

The Diocesan Fire Appeal 2019 has now been closed after raising a total of \$148,276.58, of which \$146,877.20 was distributed to bush fire affected families and businesses. The balance of funds remaining being \$1,399.38, will remain in the Bishops Disaster Relief fund for future use.

The support was greatly appreciated by the recipient communities. We are grateful to generous parishioners who supported the Bishop's Appeal.

Dear Parishioners

Bishop Gregory Homeming has provided the following provisions and guidelines for all parishes in our Diocese. Over the coming week we will review these provisions and guidelines and make some decisions about how we can provide our Parish access to these new provisions in the safest environment.

Provisions:

- 1. No public Mass is permitted. The dispensation from Sunday obligation continues.
- 2. Private Masses may be celebrated in church with ten invited people attending the Mass.
- 3. Other gatherings, by invitation, are permissible inside churches for not more than ten people.
- 4. Weddings may be conducted with ten people attending in addition to the celebrant and the couple;
- 5. Funerals should continue to be conducted at the Funeral Home, Crematorium or Graveside. This is on the advice of local funeral directors and it will be reviewed in three weeks.
- 6. Individual Baptisms with 10 people present (excluding the celebrant) are permitted.
- 7. At the discretion of the Pastor one church in each parish may be opened for private prayer for up to 10 people at any one time during specific hours as determined by each parish, with the requirement for visitors to sanitise and exit. It will also be necessary for a person to be available to monitor the COVID safe guidelines.

For all of the above, we are required to keep a record of each attendee's name and contact details and the regulations of hand sanitising and social distancing will apply. Anyone who is in a vulnerable/ at risk category will be asked to carefully consider their participation in any gatherings. Our first priority is to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of each of our parishioners.

We are also required to clean and disinfect areas used frequently after each Mass, private visit or gathering.

A WORD OF ENCOURAGEMENT TO THE CATHOLIC PEOPLE OF AUSTRALIA FROM THE BISHOPS OF AUSTRALIA

Dear brothers and sisters,

Grace and peace to you in these Easter days. We write to you from a plenary meeting of the Bishops Conference which is like no other. Unable to meet face-to-face as we normally do, the bishops are meeting online for a week. We are intensely conscious of our isolation – not only from each other but also from you, the people whom we serve in the name of the Risen Lord. As we think of you, we make our own the words of St Paul: "So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the Gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us" (1 Thessalonians 2:8).

Australia has certainly suffered because of the COVID-19 pandemic, but not as grievously as some other countries. For that we thank God and we congratulate public health authorities and governments on their prompt and prudent responses. Australians in general have also shown the solidarity and good sense, the generosity and kindness needed in such a time. In our healthcare workers particularly we have seen an exceptional spirit of self-sacrifice, and for that we are all grateful.

The Churches and other religious communities have played their part, which has meant the suspension of public worship and the closure of places of worship. This has been a real deprivation, and the bishops understand not only your anxiety about the virus and shutdown but more especially your deep desire to return to the sacraments and to resume public worship. There is a real hunger in this. It is something we all feel, and we long for the time when our hunger will be satisfied as together we return to the feast of the Lord.

Even when our doors are closed, our hearts are still open. The churches may not yet be fully open, but the heart of the Church, which is the heart of Christ, is wide open. The celebration of Mass has never ceased. Though we and our brother priests cannot yet offer Mass with the people, we are still offering Mass day by day for the people – for all of you who are "flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone" (cf Genesis 2:23). The Church which is the Body of Christ still glows with the life of Easter, "thought to be dying, yet we are alive...to be sorrowful, yet still rejoicing...to have nothing, yet possessing everything" (2 Corinthians 6:9-10).

At the heart of the community of disciples, there is always Mary the mother of Jesus (cf Acts 1:14). In this month of May, Pope Francis has urged us to look to her to intercede for us in this time of affliction; and to Mary we will entrust our homeland later this month, looking to a mother's unfailing love. May she who is Health of the Sick and Help of Christians pray for us now, that we may see Jesus with her eyes, the eyes of Easter, and love him with her heart, which is the heart of faith: "O Mother of the Word incarnate, despise not our petitions but in your mercy hear and answer us" (Memorare).

The experience of shutdown has stirred great energy and creativity among people and pastors; this is producing unexpected gifts which we will take with us into the future. No locked door can keep the Risen Lord out; he is everywhere, even in this time of distress. "I stand at the door and knock," he says. "If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come to you" (Revelation 3:20). We have heard his voice and opened the door to him who has come to us. That is the reason for our hope, even our rejoicing.

One important service which people of faith provide to the wider community in this time is an unceasing prayer of intercession. So we ask you all to continue praying in the power of faith for those who have died, who are sick or at risk from COVID-19, for our healthcare professionals, essential service providers and researchers, for all who are isolated and anxious, and for our civic leaders and health authorities.

In the hope born of faith we look forward to the time when the crisis will pass and we will be able to resume fully the Church's worship and mission, even in a landscape which may be quite changed. In the meantime, we are talking with the states and the federal government about the reopening of churches and the gradual relaxation of restrictions. We will work with governments and local authorities at each stage of any resumption of Church life. We commit to keeping ourselves and each other safe by observing strictly the advice regarding numbers, distancing and hygiene when the reopening of churches is permitted.

We urge people to abide by the best advice on how to keep themselves and others safe physically, emotionally and spiritually, especially the vulnerable elderly. That is why we recommend the live-streamed Masses and the many other resources offered on diocesan websites, our Catholic counselling services and the COVIDSafe App.

The season of Lent may be behind us, but this time of shutdown has been a kind of long Lent. Now, we pray, Easter is dawning as our country recovers from the pandemic and looks to build the future. There is no room for complacency but there is certainly room for the hope that Easter brings to birth, the hope that "after you have suffered a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen and establish you" (1 Peter 5:10-11). Looking to the God of all grace, we send to you our blessing of peace and all consolation.
