Knowing the nobody as somebody

It's easy enough to be invisible in our society, just be poor. We often don't see the outsiders, who become the nobodies, and then, quite literally, we remove them from our sight – to cheap motels, to grotty boarding houses, to the edges of our cities, to Christmas Island, while not forgetting those who lie at our gates in what we call the 'Third World': out of sight so they might all be kept out of mind.

We see them differently in this week's gospel where the nobody is revealed as a somebody. Lazarus lies at the rich man's gate, hoping for a few crumbs from his table, but the rich man doesn't see him. His lifestyle doesn't allow for Lazarus, though we often see him on our streets, occasionally thinking if I give him something he'll probably spend it on alcohol or drugs.

We're more familiar with the rich man because he resembles us, even if we think who me, rich? No way. At least he doesn't call the police to come and move Lazarus on, which is a reminder that he's not simply self-serving and Lazarus isn't necessarily virtuous, but that's not the point of the parable: it's that the rich man simply doesn't acknowledge his existence.

Then Lazarus dies and is taken up to heaven, finding a home in Abraham's bosom and, soon after, the rich man dies and finds himself in Hades. The nobody is seen as a somebody and vice versa. In torment the rich man asks Abraham to send Lazarus, whom he now acknowledges by name, with a little water to cool him, and when Abraham replies it's impossible, the rich man says, then send him to warn his five brothers, but Abraham says, let them listen to Moses and the prophets and if they won't, then someone rising from the dead isn't going to convince them.

They certainly won't listen to the prophet Amos, an outsider himself, who denounces the self-absorbed well-to-do, who are so caught up in their lifestyles that they're blinded to the needs of the poor. Nor will they sing the psalm of God's love for all those cast out, those whom scripture says we must care for. This applies as much to the Pharisees to whom the parable is addressed, as it does to us, because we're prone to the same satisfactions, the same reluctance to change our lives.

At a weekly café run by a nearby parish, lunch is provided for anyone who comes, and so they all sit down together to eat, visitors and helpers, for a moment recognising there's no more them and us, there's simply us: it's a moment of grace. And when we're able to be with the poor, the outsiders, the nobodies, and know them as somebodies, we'll begin to know Jesus Christ as Paul speaks of him at the end of the second reading, making real on earth God's unending love.

Dear friends.

The theme chosen by Pope Francis for this year's 108^{th} world Day of Migrants and Refugees 2022 is BUILDING THE FUTURE WITH MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES.



A message from the Chair

Across the Northern Rivers region, the impacts of the unprecedented flooding continue to be felt. While the resilience and strength of our community is readily apparent, we also recognise the ongoing challenges that many people including staff, students and families in our schools still face.

Our school and parish communities showed this resilient spirit when they rallied to get our students back into school within one month of the floods occurring. It has been so gratifying to see students adapt and readily return to a version of normal school life. We thank all who helped immediately following the flood and we thank students and families for their patience as we continue to ensure our students get the best possible education and support.

With the schools up and running again we now need to turn our thoughts to how we provide quality faith-based education to students across the region into the long term. This is a critical task as the decisions we make now will shape the future of not just students currently in our schools but also their grandchildren and great grandchildren. With the likelihood of increased severity and frequency of flooding across the northern rivers making these long-term decisions will require clear thinking, wisdom and compassion. We have one chance to get things right.



Bishop Greg Homeming OCD has established a Diocesan School Review Commission to examine and make recommendations to him on a range of issues covering education in the flood affected areas of the Diocese. The review will cover all Catholic schools within the area from Murwillumbah (in the north) to Coraki (in the south) to Casino (in the west), including Catholic systemic schools and Trinity Catholic College Lismore.

The brief for the review is wide ranging and is not just about buildings and finances, it will also look at educational trends and the role schools play in the

community and spiritual life of our parishes. Bishop Homeming has also asked that the Commission consult with parishes, staff parents and families and the broader community to inform our important work. In amongst all the change and there are opportunities and benefits to be realised if we get good advice and take the time to get things right.

While the Commission is undertaking the review, "temporary" will be the "new normal" for some time, but as our resourceful and committed teaching staff have shown, temporary doesn't mean compromised education or care.

Since our first communication piece issued in June 2022 we will continue to keep you updated on our work through regular Newsletters and when consultation begins later this year, I encourage everyone to get involved and look forward to talking with you then.

Recovery and healing are not straightforward processes, and some days are better than others. If you are struggling or would just like someone to talk with, community-based support is available through one of our Diocesan project partners, Resilient Lismore at floodhelpnr.com.au/resources

The Commission will be supported by Kym Griffiths, Facilities and Property Services Manager with the Catholic Schools Office. Kym has worked closely with principals, staff and families to get our flood impacted schools operational again following the floods. He is skilled in construction and operations management and will oversee the day-to-day duties of the Commission.

Working alongside Kym Griffiths will be members of the Catholic Schools Office: Stewart Brown, Assistant Director Finance and Corporate Services; John Wilson, Regional Service Leader (Richmond); Mark McDonald, Regional Service Leader (Tweed); Jenny Allen, Acting Director of Catholic Schools and Jesse Smith, Principal Trinity Catholic College Lismore who will form the Steering Committee in support of the Diocesan Schools Review Commission.

We have also engaged Capital Insight as consultants to the Commission. They will provide specialist project delivery advice based on their track record of understanding future needs in an educational environment.

Work so far

As everyone in the Northern Rivers knows, the task of rebuilding and recovery is immense. We are so proud that with the help of our staff and community, all students now have access to quality education and pastoral care. Creating a stable foundation for their education over the next few years remains our number one priority.

Schools, parishes and clean-up crews have been working tirelessly to prepare the sites for insurance assessors. Unlike previous floods where school communities were able to successfully manage their own clean-ups, the scale of the devastation this time posed significant hazards that needed to be carefully managed by specialists.

To date approximately \$1.8 million has been spent in clean-up costs and we continue to improve facilities and amenities in temporary schools with relocation expenses reaching close to \$2 million.

The Commission acknowledges the work of the parishes and school communities, and we would also like to thank the Australian Defence Force for their massive contribution in the immediate aftermath of the floods.



Next steps

With the sites now 'stabilised' the insurance assessors can start to do their work. Negotiating this process will take some time. We will also need to speak with our insurers about their willingness to underwrite insurance against future floods.

Our consultant will be studying each impacted school to understand the range of issues that will need to be considered in developing future options. Once this initial work is done, we will be able start consulting meaningfully with parishes, families and the broader community.
