## **26TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME** Year B - 29 September 2024

### Working together for God

A flock of geese flying in formation is a beautiful sight. Scientists who have researched why they fly in a V-formation have discovered some fascinating details.

First, it conserves their energy. Each bird flies slightly higher than the bird in front of it. This decreases wind resistance for each bird. Second, the geese take turns at being the leader and fall back in the group when they get tired. This enables them to fly for a long time before they need to stop for a rest.

The tired geese support the group from behind and recharge themselves as they fly at a slower speed. Third, the V-formation enables them to keep track of every bird in the group, and to communicate and coordinate with the group. In fact, research has also discovered that flying in formation is so beneficial that other birds such as ducks, ibis, swans, seagulls, pelicans, and flamingos also fly in formation.

Valuing the initiative and contribution of each person at different points in their journey and drawing the best from each member in the group are also important tenets in faith communities.

In this week's gospel, Jesus discourages the disciples from preventing a man from working a miracle in his name. Jesus tells them, "You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us". Jesus thus redirects the disciples' initial focus on excluding those who may not be in their immediate circle, to emphasising the commitment to doing the will of God: healing, teaching, and proclaiming the good news that God's love is available to everyone.

Today, we are called to embrace diversity amongst the faithful and to appreciate that the variety of our gifts and talents nourishes and enriches the entire community. Jesus speaks with great tenderness of everyone who acts in faith and good will. calling them his "little ones". He encourages us to be generous and to not exclude anyone from whole-hearted and loving service of God.

The community in Taizé, Saône-et-Loire, Burgundy, France is a modern example of a community of faith which embraces diversity. When Brother Roger founded the community towards the end of World War Two, it initially sheltered war refugees. Taizé is now renowned for being an ecumenical community of brothers, who have created beautiful music and work for peace and justice. Currently, it comprises eighty brothers from Catholic, Anglican, Protestant traditions, from nearly thirty countries. Brother Matthew, the current prior, penned a beautiful prayer recently which describes this spirit of diversity in service:

God the Creator, all that comes from your hands is good. Help us to discern your presence in the beauty of your creation, and to rejoice that we are a part of it. May your light shine on every corner of this earth and on every creature with which we share our common home.

#### Today is MIGRANT AND REFUGEE SUNDAY

#### God walks with his people



For this year's 110<sup>th</sup> World Day of Migrants and Refugees message, Pope Francis has chosen the theme, **God walks with his people.** 

God not only walks with his people, but also within them, in the sense that he identifies himself with men and women on their journey through history, particularly with the least, the poor and the marginalized. In this we see an extension of the mystery of the Incarnation.

For this reason, the encounter with the migrant, as with every brother and sister in need, "is also an encounter with Christ. He himself said so. It is he who knocks on our door, hungry, thirsty, an outsider, naked, sick and imprisoned, asking to be met and assisted". The final judgement in Matthew 25 leaves no doubt: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (v.35); and again "truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me" (v. 40). Every encounter along the way represents an opportunity to meet the Lord; it is an occasion charged with salvation, because Jesus is present in the sister or brother in need of our help.

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## **Renewal Journey**

#### September 2024 – Renewal Journey Update

An update for parishioners following the first Regional Collaboration Workshop, held on Saturday 21 September 2024, for formation of delegates from the "Pilot Cluster" parishes of Murwillumbah, Tweed Heads and Kingscliff.

Led by Trevor Cooper, Chairperson Inter Parish Collaboration Team, the workshop opened with a message of support from Bishop Greg, followed by prayer and reflection. A call to be open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit in listening and discerning and to gain benefits by sharing ideas, skills and resources in a model that involves clergy and laity in Mission and Planning.

There were four PowerPoint presentations, each one followed by a Q&A session. The Q&A sessions provided excellent feedback from the parish delegates. There was acknowledgement that the delegates offered great shared knowledge and wisdom.

- 1) A presentation on Cultural Change presenting the concept that parish collaboration starts by accepting the call for conversion, first at a personal level then as a community. Outlining the reasons why there is a need for change while also acknowledging that there may be some resistance and that is to be expected. For there to be successful change there needs to be: a sense of direction; knowledge; emotional engagement and a shaped pathway.
- **2)** A presentation on the Business Basis for Collaboration outlining one of the first tasks of collaboration needs to be a desire to work together for better organisational capability and financial sustainability in order to deliver greater parish vitality.
- **3)** A presentation on the Theological Basis for Collaboration informing our call to be a collaborative church. Collaboration among parishes in a region is a concrete expression of the Church as communion and mission. Belonging to one Body, and gifted differently, each member mutually supports each other with the gifts one has been entrusted. The information presented was supported by reference to Scripture, Canon Law and the Catechism of the Catholic Church.
- **4)** A presentation on Discernment in Common presenting an understanding of the need for an absolute trust in God's willingness and power to lead us to our goal as we all work together without prejudice in a culture of trust. With trust and prayerful discernment, the outcome will be the generation and prioritisation of ideas for improvement in our parishes.

A general question and answer session followed and delegates were also provided with an outline of the information that they will be asked to prepare for the October 2024 workshop. The day closed in prayer.



#### What is the Christmas Carnival and Nativity Tableau?

For some of our newer parishioners, school families and staff you may not be familiar with this wonderful parish community event and its 63-year history.

The Christmas carnival and the nativity play have been held since 1961 and is an annual event on the last Saturday of November that brings our Parish, our parish schools and wider community together to celebrate the start of the Advent season and share the story of Jesus' birth in a tableau format – acted out silently with narration and choir & band to provide the story and the music.

The students and staff from our three schools – Mt St Patrick Primary, St Josephs Primary and Mt St Patrick College - are all involved in the presentation of the story of Jesus' birth.

The Christmas Carnival, held in conjunction with the Tableau, is a fete with a variety of stalls and food and drinks available. Raffles, chocolate wheels and children's activities all add to the festivity of carnival night. Everyone in our Parish and our Parish School communities are asked to participate in some way with the Christmas Carnival – either by donating items for stalls or helping out on the night or at working bees on the Saturday and Sunday. We also ask each family to buy a book of 10 raffle tickets to support the Parish community. Tickets this year will be available to buy online or in printed book form.

This year our Christmas Carnival and Nativity Tableau will be held on <u>Saturday 30 November</u> with stalls and activities opening from 4 pm and the Tableau onstage at approx. 7 pm
