Preparing a way for the Lord

One of British street artist Banksy's famous pictures is *The Flower Thrower*. In this powerful image of peaceful resistance, a figure leans backwards with his arm poised to throw an object. A similar figure in other protest posters would be poised to hurl a violent projectile. Instead,

John the Baptist emerges from the wilderness, clothed in camel's hair, surviving on a diet of locusts and honey. His wild appearance is juxtaposed against his peaceful, steadfast call to repentance and the forgiveness of sins. He calls people to turn towards the One who is coming, the One who will be the embodiment of all that John currently preaches.

Jesus's spiritual kingship subverts and overturns all notions of a powerful earthly leader who dominates his subjects and rules with power. Indeed, the God whom John proclaims not only meets his people in love but also accompanies them all the way to the cross. Jesus embodies a love which is tender and compassionate but which is also fiercely committed to accompaniment and solidarity with us, in the entirety of life's circumstances.

Philosopher Hannah Arendt explained that power is the human ability not just to act, but to act in concert (On Violence, 1969). In contrast to conventional notions of power, she held that power is the ability to communicate and cooperate, not to coerce and dominate.

In contemporary times, John's call to prepare for the Lord's coming, by making rough roads smooth so that humanity will see the salvation of the Lord can perhaps be heard in the voices calling to us from the margins: the voices of women, LBGTIQ+ sisters and brothers, ethnic minorities, victims of abuse, and those fleeing persecution among others. We are invited to welcome everyone with compassion, to collaborate and stand with them. Together, we are witnesses to a community of faith which is united by love.

Building God's kingdom is almost always an uphill struggle, yet it helps to hold fast to the vision that his kingdom is both "now and not yet" and to persist with our efforts for mercy, justice and unity.

In the first reading, the prophet Baruch uses the metaphor of beauty to encourage Jerusalem to hold fast to its vision of God: Jerusalem, take off your dress of sorrow and distress; put on the beauty of the glory of God forever.

In challenging times, a helpful way to remind ourselves of the presence of God is to notice and rejoice in the beauty which surrounds us, to recognise God's presence, amidst our struggles. French philosopher Simone Weill in *Waiting for God* describes it quite profoundly: The beautiful is the experiential proof that the incarnation is possible ... "Christ is really present in the universal beauty ... the beauty of this world is Christ's tender smile coming to us."

2024 Renewal Update: Pastoral Projects Leader Dr Madeline Beveridge



This year marked significant progress across five key projects in the Diocese of Lismore's Renewal Journey. It's been an honour to visit many parishes, meeting clergy, parishioners, and staff, and witness our shared vision for a vibrant future. Special thanks go to the coordination team and Chancery staff for their steadfast support.

Youth Ministry Renewal

The Youth Ministry team, led by Fr Joy D'Souza, Gemma Ballantine, Travis Lyon, and Sister Di Moralde CM, presented a robust proposal to Bishop Greg. The plan, targeting youth engagement across age segments, aims to establish a hybrid model with regional and parish-specific youth activities.

Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) Development

Led by Fr Paul McDonald and Margaret Gill, the DPC team proposed three models for a new council, inspired by Pope Francis' call to synodality and discipleship. After consulting clergy and lay leaders, the team prepared a handbook to guide potential council members and will present their work to the Council of Priests in early 2025.

Inter-Parish Collaboration

The Interparish Collaboration team, led by Fr Roland, Trevor Cooper, Jerome Fernandez facilitated workshops in Tweed Heads, Murwillumbah, and Kingscliff, focusing on financial sustainability, organisational capacity, and parish vitality. Following this success, the team plans to expand to parishes in Coffs Harbour region.

Lay-Led Liturgy Implementation

After researching protocols and parish needs, the Lay-Led Liturgy team, led by Fr Michael Roohan and Kurt Challinor developed a comprehensive guide for lay-led services. They presented to Bishop Greg in November, with work in 2025 to support the formation of leaders and resources for parishes.

Clergy Induction and Transfer Processes

The "Clergy Welcoming" team, led by Cathy Donnelley crafted protocols for international priest inductions and parish transfers. In November, Fr Philip Borla's induction into St Carthage's Parish, Lismore, was a pilot that highlighted valuable refinements; strengthening these processes are an essential part of the Renewal Journey.

Annual Update

Madeline Beveridge Pastoral Projects Leader

The Diocesan Renewal is an exciting undertaking that seeks to bring our community to an encounter with Christ, to examine and celebrate our successes, and to continue to work towards a vibrant future as a Diocese by exploring new aspects and avenues for our ministries. 2024 has been a busy year for the Diocese of Lismore's Renewal Journey, with much progress made across five project areas. This annual update provides an overview of the work that has been achieved by these hardworking teams to date and signposts possible future directions for the Renewal Journey.

Reflecting on my past few months in the role of Pastoral Projects Leader, I have enjoyed immensely the time to visit many (not quite all!) the Parishes in our beautiful Diocese and the opportunity to meet with clergy, parishioners, and staff. I am so grateful that God's plan has led me to this opportunity to serve the Diocese as we collaborate for a bright and vibrant future.

Many thanks to the members of our coordination team for their leadership and guidance: Fr Felix Ekeh; Dr Atat Li-Kim-Mui, (Coordinator); and Mary-Ann Thackray. Our heartfelt thanks also to the staff at the Chancery and beyond who have supported the Renewal, particularly Greg Isaac (Business Manager); James Hay (Programme Manager); Barry de Silva (Communications Officer) and Margaret Haydon.

Youth Ministry Renewal

Team members: Fr Joy D'Souza, Gemma Ballantine, Travis Lyon, Sister Di Moralde CM, Bianca McInnes, and Fr Anselm Okeke.

The Youth team presented their proposal for Youth Ministry and Engagement to Bishop Greg in late October. Their proposal focused on key themes, such as 'youth are not uninterested, but unengaged', the needs of specific age segments from birth to 30+ years, and the importance of being present and accompanying parishes. They proposed a hybrid model for supporting youth ministry that included a focus on both regions and age-segment, emphasising the importance of youth ministry that was active, involved, and 'on the ground' in parishes. Following the meeting with Bishop Greg the team sought additional feedback from clergy and laity and presented to the Council of Priests (CoP) in mid-November. The CoP provided invaluable feedback and refinements, which will help to progress the proposed model.

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Development of a model for a Diocesan Pastoral Council

The Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) team examined thoroughly the history of the DPC in the Diocese, whilst also considering models of DPC that are in operation throughout other dioceses in Australia. They reflected on Pope Francis' emphasis on synodality and a call to missionary discipleship and proposed three potential models in their presentation to Bishop Greg in late October. The team also developed a handbook that could be used by a potential DPC. Following the meeting with Bishop Greg, the team consulted a wide range of highly qualified clergy and laity for feedback on their proposal. They look forward to presenting to the CoP in early 2025.

Exploring inter-parish collaboration via regional workshops

An exciting development of the Interparish Collaboration team was holding several workshops between the Tweed Heads, Murwillumbah, and Kingscliff parishes. These workshops addressed three broad areas: financial sustainability; organisational capability; and parish life vitality, while drawing together clergy and laity. These workshops provided delegates with the opportunity to work together to explore options that support the ongoing work of their parishes. The working party has commenced plans to work with a second 'hub' of parishes in the Coffs Harbour region in early 2025.

Preparation of resources, protocols and processes for lay-led liturgy implementation in parishes

The Lay Led Liturgy team has conducted extensive research into the protocols and processes for layled liturgies, producing an informative and useful guide that could be used in parishes. They surveyed parishes to develop an understanding of the current landscape of lay-led liturgies in the Diocese and to clarify the next steps for the process. This will include developing training and formation plans, and resources for parishes, with an interactive process of ongoing feedback and refinement. The team presented to Bishop Greg in late November and move towards an implementation phase in 2025, which will include a focus on formation of leaders and resources for parishes.

Design of protocols and processes for clergy induction into the Diocese; and process design and preparation for clergy and parish for clergy transfer to a new parish

Team members: Fr Alex Munyao; Matt Digges; Cathy Donnelly; Julie Nowland; and Lew Wallace.

This team, more colloquially referred to as "clergy welcoming," developed comprehensive processes for the welcoming of international priests to the Diocese as well as the transfer of priests between parishes. Following a presentation to the Council of Priests mid-year, the team refined these guidelines to incorporate feedback received. In late November, they then ran a 'pilot' case as the Diocese welcomed Fr Philip Borla from the Philippines to St Carthage's Parish, Lismore. This provided an invaluable experience of applying the guidelines to an authentic case and provided further scope for refinement whilst enhancing opportunities for collaboration with parishes as an important element of the Renewal Journey.
