## THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD | YEAR A 4 January 2026

### Wise counsel for these times

When we read the Scriptures, as with all great literature, it is often helpful to learn to read between the lines. As we celebrate the great Feast of the Epiphany, we have a perfect illustration of why this is important.



In providing us with the readings for this week, the Church is concerned that we see the connections and recognise that the significance of the visit of the 'wise men' is more important than the event itself. The way is prepared by the Prophet Isaiah, who foresees 'the glory of the Lord' breaking through the darkness that covers the earth. Moreover, Isaiah also sees that this will attract the nations of the world, and gifts of gold and frankincense will be among those loaded onto their camels.

At the same time our attention is drawn by Paul to the fact he has been specially chosen to assure the world that God's promise, revealed in the gospel of Christ Jesus, is not just for his own Jewish people but for everyone. Matthew too was at pains to remind his readers that Christ's salvation was not just for his own countrymen and women, but for all men and women of all time.

So, while Luke's infancy narrative concentrates on the actual birth of Christ in Bethlehem and the visit of the local shepherds, Matthew moves the story forward and links it with that prophetic vision of Isaiah, noted above. Bethlehem is still centre stage, but there is no mention of a stable: now, we are told, Jesus and Mary are in a house.

The wise men were able to read the signs and trusted in God's guidance. Their gifts are truly symbolic. The gold speaks to us of the new Kingdom of reconciliation, peace and love that is to be established in our hearts. The myrrh reminds us that Christ's body will be anointed after his death. He will literally love us to death and, as a result, break the bonds of sin and death once and for all. The frankincense points us to the wonder of this child, who is truly the Son of God.

As we ponder the meaning of this feast, we will do well to remember the call of the Second Vatican Council 'to read the signs of the times.' Our world needs wise men and women who can discern the will of God and know how and when to respond to the challenges of our troubled times. The more conscious we become of our dignity as adopted brothers and sisters of the Lord and therefore, with him, sons and daughters of the Father, the more likely we are to reach out in compassion to our neighbour and help build the Kingdom of God here on earth.

The wise men in the story epitomise the gifts of the Holy Spirit. They had wisdom, knowledge and understanding. They made wise judgments and had the courage to make their pilgrimage. Filled with awe in the presence of God, they worshipped him. We are called to do the same.

### Jubilee 2025 | Pilgrims of Hope

The Holy Doors of the various churches around the world are closing with Pope Leo XIV set to close the main Holy Door of St Peter's Basilica on the Feast of the Epiphany (6 January 2026), concluding the historic Holy Year that began in late 2024.

We are reminded that what closes is not the grace of God but a special time in the life of the church. Cardinal Archbishop Rolandas Makrickas emphasized during the closure of the Holy Door of the Papal Basilica of Santa Maria Greater last week in Rome that "the true door is the one of the human heart; it opens when listening to the word of God, widens when welcoming our brothers and sisters and strengthens itself in the forgiveness received and granted. So, going through a Holy Door was a gift, but becoming from now on, an open door for others is the mission entrusted to us all."

Strengthen our hope, deepen our faith, and send your Holy Spirit to keep the fire of charity burning in our hearts.
